## Poverty in Halton (2015)

Although Halton's poverty rate **(8.2%)** is below the provincial average of 14.4%, there are over **44,500** residents living in poverty as measured by the after-tax Low Income Measure (LIM -AT). LIM-AT is half of the median adjusted household income where household needs are taken into account.

In 2015, a person with after-tax income less than \$22,133 or a family of four with income less than \$44,266 is considered living in poverty.

Women are more likely to live in poverty than men. The poverty gap widens as they enter their senior years.
